Japanese Influence on Western Art and Design

Section 1

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[Course Outline / Description]

This course is designed to provide students understanding of cultural exchange in art and design between Japan and the West. Trade between Japan and the West began in the late 16th century and led to Japonisme at the fin-de-siecle. Japanese art profoundly influenced Western art and design in the development of such modern art and design as Impressionism, Aestheticism, Art Nouveau, Art Deco and so on. Therefore, the course is divided into 4 units based on chronological order of cultural exchange. In the first unit, as examining from Namban to Chinoiserie in the seventeenth and the eighteenth century, students will learn how Japan opened to the West for the first time and how Japanese political policies of isolation and globalization influenced artworks in Japan and the west. In the second unit, the emphasis will be placed on the understanding of Japanese influence on Japonisme and Impressionism in the second half of the nineteenth century. Also, as focusing on American art in the third unit, students will learn how the Japanese influence spread to the architectural buildings in the twentieth century. Student presentation and discussion in the last unit will be the chance for many students to focus on their interests within the class discipline. To understand discipline discussed in class, students are highly recommended to visit museums, historical places, and architectural buildings in Japan. Also, field trips are organized at the end of each unit. Therefore, focusing on how western artists and designers collected Japanese art and used specific elements of art and design influenced from Japanese, this course will give students new perspective studying art and design history and Japanese culture.
