[Course Outline / Description]

This course seeks ways to explicate variable, contested, and multi-layered features of urban cultures in Asian societies. The question of urban Asia, or "Asian modernity" acquires new significance at the current moment, as the impact of globalization and advancement of digital technology have created a thriving East Asian cultural market and active exchanges of pan-Asian popular cultures among different Asian locations. Looking into various forms of urban culture in contemporary Asian societies, students will be engaged in critical discussions about how people experience patterns of national and cultural expressions that are not readily reduced to fixed, static, narrative descriptions.

[Learning Assessments/Grading Rubric]

1. Class Participation (Weekly short-response papers/Group work, etc.): 40%

*Weekly Short Response Papers with comments and/or questions about the readings/texts: Students are required to use and submit 9 (minimum) short response papers evenly throughout the semester. Length: maximum of 250 words (either typed or handwritten). These are "informal" papers aimed to show how actively you have done the readings. You are free to write either/or short responses, confusions, questions that arose while you were doing the class readings (or after watching the films). You CANNOT submit these short-responses (9 or more) in lump-sum at the end of the term. You CANNOT submit multiple number of papers (like 3-4) at a single-time (i.e. The purpose of these response papers is to assist in the class discussion at a time when it happens. So old responses will not help at all).
