# Japanese Politics and Political Economy

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# [Course Outline / Description]

This course serves as an introduction to Japanese politics, primarily after WWII. As this course has no formal prerequisites, the first section of the semester will be a sort of theory "bootcamp" so as to place everyone in the class on the same footing. Following the theory section, we will first be focusing on explaining the rise of the LDP, its long-term dominance, ultimate collapse, and re-emergence as the most influential political party in Japan. Second, we will explore the rise of Japan's post-war miracle economy and subsequent decline. Third, we will address Japan's foreign policy. Fourth we will look at the evolution of the LDP's particular brand of post-reform politics and power games as played out in present day Japan. Finally, we will end the course by examining a number of key on-going issues in Japan, including immigration, nationalism, and crime.
