# [Course Outline / Description]

This course explores the history of Asian societies and cultures within the wider context of world history, from the year 1500 CE to present. Students will develop historical understanding of East, Southeast, South, and Central Asian history in the course, as well as an increased understanding of global history in the modern period. Among the themes which we will explore in the course: traditions and belief systems in Asian societies, Western colonization in Asia, imperialism, capitalism and industrial development, decolonization and nationalism, global and regional wars and conflicts, and sociopolitical, cultural, and economic developments up until contemporary times.

## Section 2

Students will increase their understanding of the history of Asian societies and their involvement in world history during the modern era. Reading, writing, and oral communication skills are essential to success in the course. Students will also improve their research and presentation skills during the course. The research presentation requires the use and analysis of historical sources in order to discuss what students discover about their topic. The presentation should be centered around the research question.
