# Modern Japanese History [in Japanese]

## [Course Outline / Description]

Intended for advance-level Japanese language learners who wish to further both their language studies and broaden their understanding of Japanese history and culture, this course offers a dynamic look at roughly 100 years of modern Japanese history. As the course will be conducted completely in Japanese, in practice this means not only the strict avoidance of English during both class lectures and discussions, but also that all assigned readings will likewise drawn from a mixture of primary and secondary sources written in Japanese. Still, as participation in this course requires no prior knowledge of modern Japanese history, both the class lectures and associated readings have been designed judiciously so as to include both coverage of larger political and economic developments as well as more focused examinations centered on portions of diaries and letters produced during each of the decades covered in this course. The hope is that this innovative design that mixes together larger historical trends with these assorted records of individual experiences will combine to deepen students' historical understanding while simultaneously furthering their Japanese language studies as well.

#### Section 2

#### [Course Objectives/Goals/Learning Outcomes]

To become acquainted with an overview of modern Japanese history similar to that learned by middle and high school students here in Japan.

To gain familiarity with not only a wide range of historical terms and vocabulary, but also learn to recognize patterns of expression associated with the study of history in particular.

To be able to follow along and participate in discussions about an academic subject in Japanese and use one's newly acquired vocabulary and language skills in order to be able to both ask and answer questions.

To recognize the different characteristics and uses of primary and secondary sources in the study of history and, through repeated practice, gain some of the requisite knowledge and skills necessary to be able to begin the process of transforming the former into the latter.
