Asian Regionalism and Economic Development

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Course Description

This course offers a comparative perspective on Asian regionalism and its role in global order. Case studies are drawn from Southeast Asia, Northeast Asia, Central Asia and South Asia. Specifically, this course addresses the nature, functional principles, leadership and policy making process of Asian regionalism. It will also introduce and assess the origins and developments of leading regional cooperation mechanisms: ASEAN, Six-Party Talks (Northeast Asian Security Cooperation Architecture), SAARC and SCO. The second part of the course will focus on the key factors that influence growth and development in Asian economies.

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

Understand the concepts and principles of Asian Regionalism

Understand the origins and development of leading regional co-operations in Asia like ASEAN, SAARC and CAREC Understand the key drivers of Asian economic growth and development issues in Asia

Readings:

Students for this course are NOT required to purchase any textbooks. Weekly readings from the main textbooks and articles from academic journals will be posted on blackboard.

Course structure

Classes will consist of lectures, discussions and group activities

Important: It is crucial that students do the readings before coming to class in order to be able to participate actively during discussions. The readings are also intended to provide students with ideas and arguments for written assignments.

Exams: There will be one mid-term and one final exam

Group work & writing assignments:

After every group work session, each student is required to write a short essay. There will be 4 short essays and each consists of 10 points. In total, ALL the writing assignments are worth 40% of your grade. The 4 short essays are based on the various topics that we will be discussing in class. The essays are about **1-2 pages in length** and have to be typed (12 font, double spaced) and turned in during the designated day and time.
